This hilarious animation film introduces an endearing screen hero, a dog called Wally. Not just your ordinary everyday mutt, Wally is "a professional," trained in home safety. His specialty: homes with young children. Wally is proud of his vocation, very earnest, somewhat pompous, and very anxious to show his stuff. The film is about his first assignment, in a household with an infant and parents with little safety consciousness.

It is a job to challenge the most seasoned of experts. Accidents and nearaccidents succeed each other with lightning speed. Relentlessly determined, Wally intervenes, always in the nick of time.

But not even his speed and ingenuity can forestall one final crisis. Pride miffed, his notions of safety outraged, and physically somewhat the worse for wear, the indomitable Wally gathers the shreds of his dignity and, with the baby, manages to escape.

Viewers young and old will be touched by Wally's almost human qualities, foibles and all, and will laugh uproariously at his valiant manoeuvres. The fast-paced animation also communicates over forty home-safety tips. Both adults and youngsters will enjoy becoming "home-safety smart."

Pre-Screening Activities, K-6Vocabulary

"accident," "safety," "protect," "prevent"

Discussion

Who can tell me what an "accident" is? Have you, or has someone in your family, ever had an accident in your home? Describe what happened. What is one thing you or your family can do so the accident doesn't happen again?

Showing the film

Tell the students they will be seeing a film about home safety. Ask them to watch for any accidents.

Post-Screening Activities

Discussion

What accidents did you especially notice? What did Wally have to do to prevent them? Had you been there, what could you have done beforehand so that the accidents would not have happened? Can you make up a safety rule that would help prevent accidents?

Activities for Babysitters-In-Training

Before the film, initiate a discussion of accidents involving young children that the students have witnessed. What might have prevented the accidents? There are approximately forty accidents or potential accidents in the film. Ask students to be attentive to each hazard they spot. After the film, discuss the accidents students noted. Include consideration of how these accidents could have been prevented, and of safety measures the students believe most important in the care of very young children.
