Ludovic Visiting Grandpa



It's summer and Ludovic is invited to spend a few days at Grandpa's farm. The little teddy bear is delighted to see his grandfather again but is saddened at the thought that Grandma is no longer with them. Grandpa must be feeling very sad because he has kept all her things in her sitting room. Ludovic is fascinated by this room filled with mementos and decides to go in. He sees Grandma's portrait and hugs it. He keeps returning and, little by little, grows accustomed to the loss of

his grandmother. Her portrait comes to life for him, and Ludovic hugs her and feels her warm embrace. He puts on her favourite music and they dance a last waltz.

This touching tale by Co Hoedeman is about the closeness and understanding

between a grandfather and his little grandson who gradually learn to accept the death of a loved one. Daniel Lavoie's score heightens the emotional effect. **Ludovic: Visiting Grandpa** is part of a quartet of films entitled **Four Seasons in the Life of Ludovic.** This charming collection of stories, all told through puppet animation, will delight children between 3 and 6.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. Before beginning the discussion, review the story line with the children, pointing out Visiting Grandpa that Ludovic's grandma has died recently and that his grandpa is feeling lonely and sad.



Ask the children how they think this visit might have been different from Ludovic's earlier visits to his grandparents. (He is a little sad himself; he is more careful of his behaviour; he tries to give his grandpa more help and attention, etc.) Allow the children to speculate freely. There are no right or wrong answers.

2. Remind the children of the hatching of the goose eggs and the fun surrounding the goslings' arrival. Help the children to see that this is a life event, that the filmmaker was showing that all of life always moves forward in this way. Point out, for example, that the harvest of fruit and flowers in summer dwindles in the fall, and in winter, the earth seems to sleep. Then, with the arrival of spring, life bursts forth once more and the cycle of life begins again. Guide the children through a discussion of the life cycle of a plant or a bird or an insect, and allow them to draw inferences to their own lives or to human life in general.

3. Lead the children to see that Ludovic helped his grandfather by simply being with him and showing his love. In this way, the young bear helped his grandfather a great deal to recover from the loss of his wife.

ABOUT THE FILMMAKER



Co Hoedeman was born in Amsterdam and immigrated to Canada when he was 25. He soon joined the National Film Board, where he directed Continental Drift (1968), Oddball (1969) and Matrioska (1970). After studying puppet animation in Czechoslovakia, he returned to the NFB and made Tchou-tchou (1972). An interest in Arctic legends led him to direct four films in close collaboration with

Inuit artists. This was followed by a number of films with innovative animation techniques: The Sand Castle (1977), The Treasure of the Grotoceans (1980), Masquerade (1984), Charles and François (1987), The Box (1989), The Sniffing Bear (1992) and The Garden of Ecos (1997).

In 2002, he completed his four-part series Four Seasons in the Life of Ludovic. In addition to Visiting Grandpa, the other videos are entitled The Snow Gift, A Crocodile in My Garden and Magic in the Air.

Hoedeman's films reveal a close observation of human interaction and an intuitive understanding of the world of children. His work has garnered numerous international awards, including an Oscar® for The Sand Castle. In Bratislava, Slovak Republic, in 1999, Hoedeman received the prestigious Klingsor Prize for his body of work.
