Lina Spunky, hard-working daughter of Eastern Europeans, determined to find a boyfriend at any cost.

These are the five teenage girls who were chosen to appear in Talk 16, after an exhaustive eight-month search by filmmakers lanis Lundman and Adrienne Mitchell.

In the year that followed, the girls were interviewed and filmed at home, in school, at work and with their friends. The filmmakers' skill was such that the girls openly shared their secrets, frustrations and dreams, and their innermost thoughts about boys, drugs, peer pressure and self-esteem.

Talk 16 is divided into six chronological segments to facilitate classroom use. If desired, the film can be screened in its entirety. A user's guide including segment descriptions and discussion starters for both teens and adults can be found on the reverse of this jacket.

HOW THE TEENS WERE CHOSEN

he filmmakers wanted a "mix" that would reflect the diversity of the Canadian population. Over an eight-month period, they interviewed 350 teenage girls from different racial and socio-economic backgrounds. Each girl was asked to draw a self-portrait and complete a questionnaire. A fifteen-minute videotape was made as an ad hoc screen test. Finally, five teens were selected to appear in the film.

DISCUSSION STARTERS FOR THE TEEN CLASSROOM

- 1. The teens in the film identified several problems in their lives. How serious do you think these really are?
- 2. Do you think the parents were as helpful as possible when it came to helping their daughters with their problems? What suggestions could you give the parents in order to improve their handling of the situation?
- 3. Teenagers tackle difficult issues from many perspectives. Do you think the girls in the film chose appropriate ways to handle contentious issues and situations?
- 4. Several families were represented in the film, each with their own definitions of what are tolerated behaviors and acceptable viewpoints. Which family was most like your own, or most like a family you would like to have?
- 5. The public at large is generally wary when they see groups of teenagers hanging around in public places, such as the mall, parks, stores, etc. As a teenager, how would you like to be treated in these situations?
- 6. Although many issues were covered in the film, it is impossible to deal with everything. As far as you are concerned, what important issues for your generation were not covered in this film?
- 7. Astra's final remark is "Don't judge us too quick." How do you think your parents' and grandparents' generations are judging your generation?
- 8. Do you think seeing this film will make it easier for your parents and teachers to understand teenagers?

DISCUSSION STARTERS FOR ADULTS

- 1. As the film demonstrates, helping teenagers develop self-esteem is a long, difficult, and challenging job for parents. Can you identify some of the strategies used by parents in the film that were successful in developing self-esteem?
- The line between nurturing, supportive parental behavior and spoiling the children can sometimes be very thin. Give examples of situations where this line has been crossed.
- 3. Teenagers are very quick to capitalize on parental differences of opinion. As parents, how have you successfully minimized being pitted against each other over an issue related to your teenager?
- 4. The film tried to show each girl growing and maturing over a period of time. Focus on one girl and describe the changes you see in her over the length of the film.
- 5. Mothers: How are these girls' teen years different from your own? Fathers: How are these girls different from the teenage girls of your youth?
- 6. Each girl speaks of issues that are important to her. How do you interpret and rate these issues in relation to the teenager's growing maturity?
- 7. Do you think this film has made it easier for you to understand and better parent your teenage daughters?



Introductions

Astra, Lina, Rhonda, Helen, Erin and their families are introduced. The teens talk about school, boyfriends and their views on drugs and alcohol.

Lina looks for a boyfriend. Astra has a boyfriend, has left home and is pregnant. The girls discuss premarital sex, their peers and feminism.

"Premarital sex? Everyone wants it."

"I'm totally against premarital sex because of my belief in God."

"I can't stand B-girls."

"I don't label myself."

"If (my mother) had been in my face, I probably would have hit her."

"Feminists are a bunch of lesbians."
