Episode Description

The Wapos Bay residents are signing up for community courses and Jacob passes on his wrestling trunks to T-Bear in the hopes that T-Bear will take up the sport. Mushom is interested in learning to navigate the Internet but jokes that the "moccasin telegraph" is probably still the best form of communication. Jacob's own university wrestling career ended when it was discovered that the cough syrup he was taking contained banned substances. T-Bear wants to please his father but is torn because he is drawn to the Métis Jigging dance course, which is scheduled for the same time as wresting. T-Bear wears the wrestling trunks but participates in the dance course instead. His deception is soon discovered when Jacob goes to observe the training. Talon and Raven use the moccasin telegraph with their friend, Amber, and misinterpret what their parents mean by "bundle of joy" The dance teacher provides an important perspective for Jacob regarding T-Bear's natural talent for jigging.

Background information

The desire to please loved ones can interfere with honouring our own talents and gifts. Imposing our own expectations on others prevents them from pursuing their own interests. The increased attention on the use of performance-enhancing drugs in sports emphasizes the importance of competing fairly and honestly. Honesty is important in competition and in the messages that we pass along.

Métis peoples have a unique culture that combines European and Indigenous traditions. One such tradition is the Métis style of dance known as jigging. Métis jigging continues to be popular at social gatherings as well as a competitive event.

European traders developed alliances with Indigenous families and groups through marriage. Their children developed into a unique nation with traditions that combined aspects from both parents, including the use of a language known as Michif. Louis Riel and Gabriel Dumont were prominent Métis leaders who fought for Métis rights to land. Louis Riel was tried, convicted and executed for opposing Canada's expropriation of Métis land. The events leading up to these actions continue to be contested by the Métis; many aspects of the conflict were unjust.

The moccasin telegraph refers to a time when many Aboriginal peoples travelled on foot. In their travels they passed on news and gossip. The moccasin telegraph continues to operate in many Aboriginal communities.

Métis dancing requires physical talent and stamina.

The Internet and other types of media influence human behaviour and daily life in all parts of Canada, including northern communities such as Wapos Bay

PROJECT IDEAS
