

## OUESTIONS FOR DISCUSSION

- 1. Trace the moral decisions the heroine makes in the film. Discuss some of the techniques that the filmmaker uses to provoke reflection on the morality of behavior and situations.
- 2. Discuss different ways you can appear and behave in your daily life. Does this mean you are really different people?
- 3. You discover that you were one of two identical twins. The other one did not survive. Are you lucky to be the survivor, or does it matter? If the other one had survived, would that person have been you?
- 4. Discuss the following themes: the nature of personal identity: moral questions surrounding organ transplants, euthanasia, suicide, abortion, cloning, genetic manipulation, and artificial intelligence; the scientist's responsibility for his or her scientific breakthroughs: personal, societal, and technocratic responsibility for the use of new ideas in technology.











#### ABOUT THE ANIMATOR

John F. Weldon was born in Belleville, Ontario in 1945, He won prizes for his math skills in high school, and attended McGill University in Montreal, where he graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Psychology and Mathematics.

Since joining the National Film Board of Canada, Weldon has collaborated on over thirty films and has animated and directed eight of his own. Weldon's unorthodox sense of humor and innovative approach to animation make his work unforgettable. Spinnolio (1977) follows the career of a wooden puppet who makes a passive but quite successful attempt at "life" until he is traded in for a computer. Weldon's Academy Award-winning short Special Delivery (1979), is a black comedy about adultery, death and the Post Office, Real Inside (1984), a film combining live action and animation, is a rollicking tale about a cartoon character's attempt to climb the corporate ladder.

More recently. Weldon has directed his talents towards creating entertaining educational films. Of Dice and Men (1988) is a computer-animated film that guides students through the mathematical theory of probability.
