Would I Ever Like to Work

Joan is a welfare mother with seven children. Originally from the Maritimes she now lives in Montreal. She would like to work as a waitress - feels she'd be a better mother. But day care in her area is fifteen or twenty dollars a week

Questions to ask ourselves:

Why do some of us question the presence of small amenities in a welfare

What kind of crime committed by a 15-year-old girl would result in imprisonment?

In some places welfare mothers are pushed (to say the least) into sterilization. Others, like Joan, are refused. Is this a contradiction?

"I wanted to run, so I ran and I'm sorry now I did." Have you ever felt like that?

Joan has neighbors with similar problems. How might their situation be improved? Whose responsibility is it?
